FIRST EDITION. Focusing on pioneer pharmacists, Anderson traces the transformation from secret patent medicines known only to herbalists, hydropaths, eclectics, Thomsonians, and homeopaths to a medical regime in which qualified physicians controlled drug distribution. This book was of interest to the collector who brought these Iowa books together, because his family made a fortune on patent medicines. The family built a large house that is now a museum. The family is in possession of correspondence from one of the ancestors who served as a traveling salesman for the firm. In 1906 he was in Washington, DC when the Pure Food and Drug Act was being debated, and wrote home that the family business was about to be changed forever.

FIRST EDITION. This is the Iowa Third Congressional District edition; Andreas made 9 separate editions of this atlas, one for each of the 9 Congressional Districts, and each having special views of the individual district (Stanford University SearchWorks catalog). This *Atlas* is the greatest work of A. T. Andreas, who lived in Davenport Iowa where he engaged in compiling and publishing county and State atlases in partnership with John Milton Lyter. This was Andreas' most successful *Atlas*, financially, and its accuracy made it an official authority for real estate developers and dealers, and county and State officials. Andreas was born in Amity, New York, and migrated to Dubuque, Iowa where he taught school and conducted business. Andreas enlisted in Company G, 12th Illinois Infantry, and served in the Civil War, eventually acting as division commissary with Sherman on the March to the Sea and during the Carolina campaigns. FIRST EDITION. The other authors include James Ott Crosby (1828-19??) and Joseph Warren Jarnagin (1853-1932). The World's Columbian Exposition was held in Chicago in 1893 to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' arrival in the New World in 1492. The centerpiece of the Fair was the large water pool which represented the long voyage Columbus took to the New World. Iowa prepared this handbook to be placed at the Exposition to highlight the resources and advantages of the State. In typical nineteenth-century style, Mr. James Ott Crosby was placed in charge of preparation of Department F, Women's Work. Nevertheless, the volume contains an important overview of the history and statistics of Iowa to date.

FIRST EDITIONS. This volume contains 20 issues of the Cornell College *Catalogue*, 1861-1880, inclusive, bound in one volume. Each catalog lists the Boards of Trustees, Faculty, Students listed by class, gender, primary department of study, list of Course of Studies, and facts and figures about Cornell College and its financial status. Beginning in the mid 1870s, the *Catalogues* run period advertising for goods and services of interest to college students. Located in Mount Vernon, Iowa, Cornell college has been changing lives and changing educational norms since 1853. It's website notes that Cornell College was the first college west of the Mississippi to grant women the same rights and privileges as men, and, in 1858, to award a degree to a woman. Cornell College was among the first to recognize the science of education in 1872 when it began offering education courses, which are listed in the *Catalogues* bound in this *Sammelband*. A previous owner used these *Catalogues* with their lists of students to trace family ancestry. A detailed bibliographic list of the *Catalogues* is available upon request.

FIRST EDITION. Title page lists J. M. Dixon as "Blind Editor" and Mrs. J. M. Dixon and J. W. Doughty as amanuenses. Joseph M. Dixon was the editor of the Iowa Citizen newspaper of Des Moines, who lost his eye sight. He also wrote *The Valley and the Shadow: Comprising the Experiences of a Blind Ex-Editor* (1868). He dictated this history of Polk County, Iowa to his wife and his wife's brother, J. M. Doughery. Des Moines is the county seat of Polk County and the capital city of Iowa. It is also the most populous county of the state.

FIRST EDITION. The WPA Iowa *Guide* was sponsored by the State Historical Society of Iowa. The book gives a history of the state, remarks on its notable citizens, and discusses the major cities as well as small towns, some of which no longer exist. This volume is also an important tourism guide, with descriptions of routes to take and things to see along the way. FIRST EDITION. Published posthumously, this slender volume tells the history of early Des Moines beginning in the early 1840s through the introduction of many "firsts" including the first military occupation, the first steamboat, the building of log cabins, the first residents, the founding of the brick industry and so forth. Tactius Hussey, a native of Indiana, was a printer, philosopher, pioneer, nature lover, and poet. Hussey arrived in Des Moines on November 9, 1855. He worked at the printing office of the *Statesman* and other printing offices, until 1901. Hussey also wrote a number of songs, several of which are included in this volume.

FIRST EDITION. William H. Ingham (1827-1914) was born in frontier Herkimer County, New York. An aborted trip to the California gold fields in 1849 found Ingham in Minnesota and Iowa where he explored western Iowa and finally settled in Kossuth County in north west Iowa. From his vantage point as one of the first white people in the state, William Ingham's accounts are given great weight, but the journalist Harvey Ingham has done his best to corroborate these accounts with those of William Ingham's contemporaries. William Ingham went on to become an Indian fighter, real estate developer, and banker. Harvey Ingham was co-owner and editor of the *Des Moines Register*, 1903-1943. FIRST EDITION. What do you do when you live is a sparsely populated continent, and you want your section to be filled with enterprising individuals who will be "good" property owners and create wealth through individual striving? FIRST EDITION. John Harvey Kellogg was an American medical doctor, nutritionist, inventory, health activist, and businessman. Kellogg was the director of the Battle Creek Sanitarium in Battle Creek, Michigan, an institution founded by members of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church. Kellogg was a major leader in progressive health reform, particularly in the second phase of the Clean Living Movement. He wrote extensively on science and health combining scientific knowledge with Adventist beliefs, promoting health reform, temperance, and sexual abstinence. LIMITED EDITION of 500 copies. Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the second largest city in Iowa and county seat of Linn County, traces its white settlement origins to the 1830s; it was resurveyed in 1841 and renamed Cedar Rapids. It was incorporated on January 15, 1849. Charles Laurance was born October 28, 1855 near Rochester, New York; his family moved to Cedar Rapids in 1860. Charles Laurance was affiliated with the printing industry in Cedar Rapids from the 1880s and in 1896, founded the Laurance Press Company. Laurance was involved in all the fraternal organization of the town, and kept extensive files and scrapbooks regarding the goings-on of Cedar Rapids, which eventually formed the historical documents that undergird this important account of the city's founding and development.

FIRST EDITION. This volume has the virtue of containing detailed accounts of life in Iowa during the second half of the nineteenth century. Charles Clinton Nourse was a noted orator and leading temperance advocate in Iowa, who served as Iowa Attorney General (1861-1864) and later was a distinguished judge. After graduating from the Law Department of the Transylvania University of Kentucky in 1850, Nourse moved to Iowa, settling in Keosauqua. He is buried in Sierra Madre, California. ABBREVIATED EDITION. Nathan Howe Parker's first foray into Iowa Guide Books is his 1855 *Iowa as it is in 1855: A Gazetteer for Citizens....* (Chicago, etc. 1855). Howes notes an 1855 edition, 2 1856 editions (264 and 282 pp.), and this abbreviated edition of 188 pp. Howe was responsible for a number of trans-Mississippi atlases in the 1850s and 60s, including but not limited to: *The Kansas and Nebraska Handbook for 1857-8* (1857); *Parker's Geological Map of the State of Missouri* (1865); *Missouri as it is in 1867; Stranger's Guide to St. Louis* (1867); *The Western Quarterly: A Record of Statistics and Facts Respecting the Resources, Productions, Manufactures and Improvements of Missouri and Adjoining States* (1868). In the early guide books, Parker asks correspondents to send him relevant facts and statistics to offices in Iowa, Kansas, and Minnesota. There is evidence that Parker opened a newspaper with a group lawyers as backers, but of this particular enterprise, and his life in general, there remains little trace.
